# Exeter enthusiast wins 3rd annual World Crokinole Championship

Someone once said, the third time is a charm. Well, Joe Fulop of Exeter proved it by winning the 3rdd Annual World Crokinole Championship in Tavistock Annual World Crokinole Championship in Tavistock on Saturday, June 2nd, the day of his 57th birthday.

Mr. Fulop has participated in all three world championships in Tavistock and the past two years has come away with the 20's trophy (90 in 1999 and 101 in 2000), 3rd place in 2000 and 2nd place in 1999, but never the world title. This year, defending champion Al Fuhr of Shakespeare topped the 20's in the preliminary rounds with 95 in 40 games, but Joe Fulop prevailed to edge Paul Hartman of Cambridge, 2-1 in a best two-out-of-three final to take home the championship trophy.

Competition began at 9:00 a.m. Saturday as 361 crokinole enthusiasts registered to play in six different categories, the newest being cue singles. Play was about twenty minutes late getting underway in the morning and again for the final rounds so that the champion in each category was not decided until after 10 p.m. An enthusiastic crowd of onlookers stayed to the very end and added to the excitement of the final rounds as scores were announced after each game. Evening play began with the junior championship decided in a round-robin affair with the top six players come away with the 20's trophy (90 in 1999 and 101 in 2000), 3rd place in 2000 and 2nd place in 1999, but never the world title., Massachusetts received honourable mention. In the meantime, preliminary singles play for cues, seniors and intermediates was underway with the top sixteen players in two pools of eight in round robin play. The top two from each pool then played a second round robin playoff to determine ranking. In the end, the top two players faced each other for first and second place while third and fourth played for the final prize.

Joe Fulop earned the senior singles championship trophy and \$1,000 cash while Paul Hartman came away with 2nd place and \$500; Robert Steckly of RR 3, St. Marys, 3rd place and \$250; and Bill Freeman of RR 2, Petersburg, a certificate for honourable wey of Kitchener earned the intermediate title and \$200 cash for first place, followed by mention in fourth place.

Jeremy Howey of Kitchener earned the intermediate title and \$200 cash for first place, followed by Hersh Patel of New Jersey, USA taking home \$125. Third place and \$75 went to Jay Patel, also of New Jersey, while Tavistock's Matt Brodrecht received honourable mention.

The newest category in the event, cue singles, was won by Nyle Eby of Kitchener with second place to Harvey Benneweis of Kitchener. Doug Eby, Kitchener was third and Howard Herrle of Kitchener placed fourth. Cue Doubles and Doubles play was completed in the morning with more than 90 participants. Six teams played off after the preliminary scores were tabulated. Cue Doubles champions were Ivan Coward and Harvey Benneweis of Kitchener. The pair shared \$400 for first place while in second place Donald and Mike Neal of Arthur earned \$250. Mel Shantz of RR 2, Petersburg and Harold Jones of New Dundee shared \$150 for third place and honourable mention went to finalists Carl Nicklas and Alfred Ropp, both of Tavistock. Also participating in the final round were Tavistock's Raymond Schwartzentruber and Harold Zehr, and Sam Wagler and Wilmer Wagler. Dan Shantz and Bill Freeman of RR 2, Petersburg earned first place in doubles play followed by Paul Hartman and Jarmo Puiras both of Cambridge in second. Brothers

Jason and Raymond Beierling of Varna captured third place while Wayne and Deretmo Puiras bin second. The noon-hour presentations to cue doubles and doubles champions was emceed by Lee Griffi while the evening ceremony was announced by Dr. Bruce Halliday, under the direction of crokinole committee chairperson Mary Alice Roth. All \$4,650.00 in cash prize money was raised through donations by local businesses within the community and representatives from each were on hand to make the presentations. This year's event was filmed by Toronto teacher and amateur filmmaker Greg Taylor who is putting together a documentary film on the World Crokinole Championship which he expects to have completed by the fall of this year.
