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The Tavistock Open Fiddle and Stepdance Championships is sponsoring a Business and Residential Display competition this year. Prizes will be awarded to the display which best promotes this event. There will be no entry fee but the business or resident must register by June 21, 2003 with the contest committee by calling 655-2319. Judging of the displays takes place on June 28th. Prizes will be awarded on Thursday, July 3rd at the Jamboree held at the Tavistock Curling Club.

Two noticeable differences in the fifth annual World Crokinole Championship were the presence of thirty of the new WCC<sup>™</sup>endorsed boards and the media attention the event received this year. While Raymond Kappes was concentrating on his adult singles championship win, video cameras and flashes were seen throughout the arena catching glimpses of both happy and sometimes frustrated players in the seven categories of play.

WCC<sup>™</sup> Committee chair Barry Raymer said the media coverage was great and the way everything comes together is 'super'. "Maybe we're just starting to come into our own. People now realize how much fun crokinole can be!" Compliments and appreciation shown by the players to committee members "makes all the work worthwhile," he added. Total registration reached 398 in 2003. When the committee was formed in 1999, a goal of 400 players was set. The first year saw 278, 310 in 2000, and 361 in 2001, and 385 in 2002. "It looks like we'll surpass that 400 number next year," he said. And if it weren't for a few last minute U.S. cancellations, registrations would have been over 400 this year. Raymond Kappes of Waterloo took home \$1,000 cash and the adult singles title for 2003. 2000 adult singles champ, Al Fuhr of Shakespeare earned second prize followed by Raymond Beierling of Varna in third place and Bill Freeman of RR 2, Petersburg in fourth. Joe Fulop of Exeter, who has won the singles title the past two years, ranked third in the preliminary round, but failed to make the final four.

During competition, players were more than impressed with the new WCC boards. Their consistency was the biggest asset to this year's event. The only negative comment heard was that the side rail was a bit too high. However, chairman Barry Raymer said they were designed that way to keep stray buttons from ricocheting onto the floor. A wider shooting area was also incorporated to allow a more comfortable set-up of the shooting disc.

A new division introduced this year was recreational play in the afternoon. Twenty-four participants of almost every age played for the \$200 cash, trophy and title. Jeremy Howey of Kitchener, 2001 intermediate champion, earned the title with Lloyd Wiseman of Kitchener in second place. Gerald Bedard of Stittsville was third and John Howard of Woodstock was

Second place went to Bill Freeman and Dan Shantz of RR 2, Petersburg; third to Raymond Kappes and Kevin Bechtel both of Waterloo; and fourth place to Rob Jones and Paul Mackie, both of Kitchener.

Cues tables, complete with lazy susan boards, were set up at the west end of the arena floor and both singles and doubles play were enjoyed. Wayne Coward of Pickering earned the cue singles title by defeating second place Oscar Weber of St. Jacobs in a double tie-breaker. Tavistock participants Sam Wagler and Carl Nicklas squared off to earn third and fourth place respectively.

In cue doubles, Carl Nicklas of Tavistock and his son-in-law, Terry Ross, of Embro, defended their title from 2002 by earning the 2003 championship. Second place went to the father and son team of Mike Neal and Donald Neal of Arthur. Brothers, Enoch Weber of Drayton and Oscar Weber, St. Jacobs, placed third while Donald Mohr and Howard Herrle, both of St. Agatha, were fourth. Five thousand dollars in cash and prizes was given out over the one-day tournament. Early bird draw WCC<sup>™</sup> jacket winners were also presented with their prizes on Saturday. Winners were Diane Ferguson of Bright and Tim Wigglesworth of Elmira. A draw table was set up just around the corner from the registration desk at the entrance to the Tavistock and District Recreation Centre. An official board, donated by Wiffen Home Hardware, was won by Bobby Pettigrew of Vienna. Other prizes included a cake from Ritsma Bakery, gift basket from Nosy Nook, summer sausage from Westavi Farms, and a gift certificate from Moose Winooski's restaurant. T-shirts and golf shirts were sold throughout the day as

well as the numbered, official crokinole boards.

Pedro Mendes, the new media producer for CBC Radio Canada, attended this year's event and played in the recreational division in the afternoon. He spent the day interviewing players and spectators, organizers and volunteers, for his radio broadcast on Wednesday morning at 10:00 a.m. at CBC Radio One 99.1 FM.

Mr. Mendes was introduced to the game by his fiancé's (Manitoba) Mennonite family. Now he just loves it, he said. "I'm fascinated by the game, its history and why players are so passionate about it," he said."I'd really like to try to capture the flavour of the event and what makes it unique," he concluded.

At the same time, Brendan Howley of Stratford, a writer for Saturday Night Magazine, and photographer, Patrick Fordham, stayed until the finals in the evening to record a different perspective on the tournament. Mr. Howley said he couldn't think of another event where you can buy a summer sausage at the registration desk. It's just amazing the way people here work together, he said.

You and Media, a Toronto-based production company that specializes in independent short films, documentaries and corporate promotions was on hand to shadow two Toronto-area amateur players for adult singles and doubles competition. Producer and director Brian Smith, and co-producer Bill Fraser, a competitor in the last two championships conducted interviews with tournament organizers, competitors, and local residents. They envision a 30-minute documentary to be marketed to film festivals and documentary broadcasters. It is hoped that the WCC committee will get a chance to see the final version when it is complete.
