Smully's Tavistock Merchants travelled to Niagara-on-the-Lake this past weekend and despite being a little short on pitching managed to finish in 3rd place.

On Saturday, the team opened with a 3-2 extra inning win over the Rochester New York Bombers. Steve Cook was the winning

Newcomer takes top prize at crokinole tournament

A millwright and father of five from Palmerston, Ontario is the World Crokinole Championship Adult Singles Champion for 2005 following Saturday's 7th annual event which hosted a record 466 participants.

"I'm still in shock ... this is amazing," Bruce Hartung said when asked by awards emcee Mayor Don McKay about winning the \$1,000 top prize. "No one's going to believe me when I get home,"he added.

Bruce and his eldest son, Andrew, attended this year's event for the first time after he found details of the world tournament on the internet. Bruce said he grew up playing crokinole at home, mostly during the holidays. "I was always trying to beat my mother at the game,"he said.

He and Andrew played in the doubles tournament in the morning where they finished second in the preliminary round out of 96 teams but failed to make the top four in that final. The team of John Conrad, Milverton and Paul Hartman, Cambridge, took home first place in that division. Mr. Hartung and his son finished in the top sixteen out of 134 in the adult singles category, but Andrew failed to make the final four. Second place in adult singles went to Brian Cook of Owen Sound; third to Joe Fulop of Exeter, and fourth place to Paul Hartman 2000 World Champion Al Fuhr of Shakespeare was awarded the 20's trophy for scoring the most 20's (88) in preliminary play. He and his son, Jeff, were another father and son team that made it into the top sixteen finalists. This year's event once again was held in the Tavistock and **District Recreation Centre. Forty**nine tables were set up in the morning to accommodate the Doubles registrants. In the cue doubles division, twenty-two teams played with Doug and Nyle Eby of Kitchener taking home the

In the Junior Singles event, Teskey Baldwin of Plattsville took home the \$100 cash prize and trophy with second place to Bobby Pettigrew of Vienna, third place to Travis Ramseyer of Tavistock; and fourth place to Brett Allard of Simcoe.

Comment cards in the past have suggested the top players should be in a league of their own, but this year's winner showed that there may be a lot more skilled players out there to win future championships.

W-O school reunion; a wonderful weekend

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"Celebrating fifty years of excellence in education" was the motto for this past weekend's anniversary of Waterloo-Oxford District Secondary School in Baden. And the celebrations began Friday night at the school where hundreds, if not thousands, of present and former students and staff gathered to remember their connections to that beloved country high school.

Friday night's opening ceremonies officially kicked off the weekend of events that was billed as a "homecoming." Decade rooms were set up for classmates to meet and reminisce with lots of yearbooks, sports equipment and school clothing, and other memorabilia to help rekindle the memories. From prom dresses to lettered sweaters and leather club jackets, each room captured a glimpse of the 10-year period. These years produced hundreds of graduates from the four former continuation schools of New Hamburg, Tavistock, Plattsville and New Dundee as well as students from Wellesley and Baden and the other small communities in the immediate rural area.

Teacher Jeff Gerber was emcee for the opening ceremonies Friday night as six of the eight school principals joined him on stage including Lorne Caughill (1967-71), Ron Gohl (1971-81), John Pinnington (1988-91), Elvin Rudy (1991-96), Robert Schmidt (1996-98) and Brian Rainville (1998-2005). The school's first principal was the late I. W. MacNaughton (1955-67) and serving from 1981-88 was the late R. J. Budicky.

Mr. Gerber commented on the school's stellar reputation for excellence and success as graduates have gone on to become members of parliament, police and fire chiefs, teachers, lawyers, as well as farmers. Graduate and Member of Parliament for **Kitchener-Conestoga Lynn Myers** brought greetings and congratulations from Prime Minister Paul Martin for the school's contribution to the development of young hearts and minds. Waterloo **Regional Police Chief Larry** Gravill offered his congratulations and said he looked forward to seeing the people who had a strong influence on his life. Mayor Wayne Roth (grad 1957) gave a "warm Wilmot welcome" to those in attendance. Others bringing greetings included Colin Harrington, chairperson of the Waterloo Region District School Board, who noted that there have been seven major additions or renovations to the school over the past fifty years. He said the school has"forged a strong tradition that has lived up to its motto"-"Carpe Diem." School District Superintendet Elaine Lewis said education is a lasting contribution to youth from the three counties it serves.
