Brian Cook wins fourth title Records were meant to

16TH ANNUAL WORLD CROKINOLE CHAMPIONSHIP

be broken and Brian Cook did it Saturday night becoming the first adult singles player to win four World Crokinole titles. But like all records, the road to winning wasn't easy.

Up against 2010 champion Justin Slater in the final, Brian had to take it to a tiebreaker to secure the trophy. "I hate having to play him," said Brian following the tense final. "I tried to keep it simple and focus on my 20's," he said about his strategy. As for his fourth championship, "It's a big relief," he added.

Brian previously won three years in a row, from 2007 to 2009, before being defeated in 2010 by the then 17-year-old Justin Slater, the youngest player to win the singles championship. 2011 belonged to Ray Beierling, then it was John Conrad who accomplished back-toback titles in 2012 and 2013.

Brian also has five second place finishes in the tournament as well as a third place finish.

Brian Cook, a 45-year-old researcher with Toronto Public Health, was married November 8, 2013 in Capetown, South Africa, to Stephanie Banks, whom he met through the Toronto Crokinole Club. He admitted he hasn't been practicing as much as he should leading up to the Tavistock tournament.

On the other hand, Justin Slater hasn't been practicing as much either as he continues his studies at Dalhousie University in Halifax, Nova Scotia. Tavistock's Wavne

Brian Cook set a new record as the first four-time grand prize winner of the World Crokinole Championship Adult Singles division at the 16th annual tournament on Saturday, June 7, 2014.

Schultz wasn't to be outdone by Cook as he captured the Cue Singles championship for the fourth time as well. Wayne defeated Andrew Hutchinson in this year's final in another tiebreaker to add to his total of four firsts, two seconds and three third place finishes. Wayne also teamed up with Floyd Kuepfer of Milverton to take second place in the cue doubles division. Dennis Brubacher earned the most 20's in Cue Singles play with 95. Andrew Hutchinson partnered with David King to win the Cue Doubles title.

Raymond Beierling managed 131 20's in the round robin portion of the tournament to take home the trophy. The finger Doubles championship went to Fred and Justin Slater while the **Recreational Doubles** champions were Robert Bonnett, Wingham and Peter Carter of Teeswater. Albert Leitch won the **Recreational Singles title** again after a three-year layoff. Tyson Kuepfer was

the Intermediate winner and Abijah Jong repeated as the Junior champion. Another repeat winner was Bev Vaillancourt of Penetanguishene who took home the Karin Jeske

Award for the top female player in the Singles tournament. Bev won the trophy last year and this year managed 39 points and 65 20's in the preliminary round.

Registration for this year's 16th Annual Championship was down slightly with about 240 players registered in 367 playing spots. Travelling the furthest distance was Viva Jongsma who now lives in La Serena, Chile, South America. She went there two years ago to visit a former exchange family and work as a German and French translator. There she met her future husband and the couple are expecting their first child in September.

Our friends from south of the border also attended with representatives from Louisville, Kentucky; Fort Wayne, Indiana; Ohio, Connecticut, Vermont, Michigan and New York. From across Canada, eight players returned from Prince Edward Island and one from Burnaby, British Columbia.

The oldest male player this year was Curtis Ryan of Kitchener who is almost 83. Aden Brubacher and Orvie Martin were close seconds at 82 years. Lorraine Proud was the oldest female in the competition at 79 years. The youngest players were siblings Jahrijeh Jong, 6, and his sister, Zionne Jong, 8, of Hamilton.

The day's proceedings were opened and closed with words from East Zorra-Tavistock Mayor Don McKay. Ken Wettlaufer was emcee for the day.
